The short answer is no. But what sucks is it's happening whether we need it or not. Unlike the three waves of ska-which were not only necessary but inevitable-the three waves of emo, to date, are a bit harder to parse out and sadly reveal a tragic, full collapse (sorry, I had to) of the American Empire as a whole. Also... unlike the three waves of ska, which actually had huge generational gaps, and with each wave signifying a rediscovery and reinterpretation, the waves of emo are actually more like one slow-burn, catastrophic tsunami, which crested and made landfall in every white American suburb in the mid-2000s. This bubbling fourth wave that's coming, whether we are ready for it or not, is more of a literal second wave, since there's that generational gap and rediscovery process. Since there is no stopping this follow-up tsunami, we might as well prepare for it, and you, the reader, might as well learn how we got here.


A little history, first. Emo started in 1985 with Rites of Spring's first and only album. This start date is about as accurate as saying punk started in 1976, with Ramones' debut. It's simply a nice, clean, easy start date. Obviously, punk, hardcore, and post-hardcore bands in the late ' 70 s and early ' 80 s were dealing with more personal and self-searching issues in lyrical content. Have you ever read any Henry Rollins-era Black Flag lyrics? Dude is literally using being in a band as a substitute for therapy. Strip away the self-righteousness, and Minor Threat's "In My Eyes" is essentially an emo song. But either way, Rites of Spring's debut is simply a nice goalpost we can start at.

This "first wave" in Washington, DC, was fairly
limited to that city, with bands like Rites of Spring, Embrace, and Dag Nasty. Basically, anything on Dischord Records in the '80s can be considered Emo Mark I. So what's the connecting thread? The impetus? Musically, it makes sense. Young people like playing loud, energetic rock music, and if you're not that politically literate, what are you gonna sing about? Your feewlingz. That's the lazy, plebian explanation. I think there was something more nefarious at work. Where and when are we? Fucking DC in the '80s! We are smack dab in the middle of Regean's Evangelical Theocratic Capitalist Hellscape! While these spry, young punk rockers may not have been intentionally responding to the cruel gutting of any and all possible economic future for themselves, I'm a firm believer that the environment you live and breathe in permeates your art. You see the high-rise buildings shoot up and the homeless shelters and mental health clinics shutter-the garbage piles up as trade unions fight their last heroic stand before finally getting swept under the neoliberal juggernaut façade of happiness. A new class of coke-raddled business elites in yellow ties step over droves of homeless that just got kicked out of those evil, taxpayer-burdening, nanny state establishments.


The left-wing political ire of English punk and bored apathy of the New York brand (and, to an extent, the earlier stuff in Detroit) clearly did nothing. Bad Brains started off the decade strong with some tight, succinct political grievances delivered at lightning speed, but they quickly fizzled out into a wash of drugged-out reggae without getting a movement going. I think sad suburban introspection was really the only thing left to sing about. The powers that be cannot be destroyed or dissuaded with music, so fuck it, let's just read our diary but jump around while doing it.


The second "wave" is a little more difficult to pin down but is largely referring to the "Midwest emo" phenomenon of the mid-'90s. Again, when you zoom into the nitty gritty, it really does start looking like one big tsunami rather than separate waves since we got a direct line from the initial DC scene to Fugazi and Jawbreaker in 1990, which is spitting distance from Sunny Day Real Estate's '94 debut masterpiece-vaguely the beginning of this second wave. Yes, I realize Seattle isn't in the Midwest, but it was hit just as hard by the neoliberal gilded age of the '90s. The glossy, end-of-history era where all major American producers outsourced their labor to countries where they could get away with shameless worker exploitation, and literally all the money was funneled to douchey tech startups, as this awful homunculus known as the internet was congealing into existence. This is where a more recognizable style known as emo flourishes, with The Get Up Kids, The Promise Ring, Cap'n Jazz, and Mineral providing the soundtrack for disaffected suburban youth across the nation. Again, while most of these bands were probably not consciously commenting on the literal dissolution of the American Dream before their very eyes, it was in the air they were breathing, especially in

And even though it seems this would be the generation to be more politically engaged and more involved in their communities, the last few election cycles have all but proven that nothing is going to change, and the people in power are only going to work to keep that power. They were told to vote, they did, and rent is still skyrocketing while we're still throwing missiles in every direction. It's nice to see some Starbucks and Amazon warehouses unionizing, and it was kind of a relief that an unintelligent, failed reality TV star that wears a diaper didn't get a second term as President...but still, everything feels pretty stagnant and hopeless. Time to break out the diary and jump around in the community center event hall! Whether or not America needs a fourth wave of emo, we certainly deserve it.

## BIZARREB00ZE-THISTRANGESTALCOHOLIC:EVERAGESEVER

Alcohol. Mankind has had a relationship with it forever. The earliest known historical record of a deliberately made drink, a sort of wine, was from China in around the year 7000 B.C. It's also a well-known fact that beer was important to the ancient Egyptians, as many tombs had jars of beer in them, and it's described as being part of the daily ration for those who were building the pyramids.

Our relationship with the sauce may go back even further than ancient China or Egypt. Humans, as a species, are rare among creatures for our ability to metabolize alcohol, but our close relatives in the ape family, chimps, bonobos, and gorillas*, also share this ability. It has been suggested that our pre-human ancestors did, too.


Early hominids, much like apes who cannot legally buy beer until now, most likely waited for things to ferment naturally and then ate or drank them. " $U g$, you leave fruit in sun, wait for smell funny, then eat fruit and feel real unga-bunga." This suggests that we have always con-
sumed hooch since the very beginning of our whole species. We have clearly moved past eating rotten fruit and have taken the art of booze-making in some very odd directions. I'm going to cover some of the weirdest types of alcohol people have invented in their quest to tie one on.

Listed in no particular order.


Originating at the hands of a Swedish immigrant to Chicago, who initially sold it for "medicinal use" in the early 20th century, Malört is a liquor flavored with aniseed and wormwood. It's a modest liquor, at only $35 \%$ alcohol by volume (ABV), but the strangeness comes from two things: the fact that it's pretty much only found in Chicago and the taste. It's a bitter, herby liquor, and the flavor has been described in such festive ways as "Iike pencil shavings and heartbreak" or "taking a bite out of a grapefruit and then drinking a shot of gasoline." Despite this, it remains reasonably popular in Chitown and is, in fact, gaining popularity because of some high-profile appear-
ances in TV shows, though this increase in interest has truly only been inside the city. Next time you're there, ask for Malört-but be aware of its nature. I might suggest holding your nose.


## Yogurito

It's a liqueur, and it's made of yogurt. Like many of the world's odd things, it's from Japan. Much like the Malört, that's really the only place it's consumed. Typically found at about $16 \%$ ABV, it's fairly mild. If you ever wanted to get drunk on yogurt, this is for you. It can be taken straight, but most drinkers of the milky beverage mix it with fruit juice or soda, in kind of a lactose-heavy version of things like screwdrivers and even Moscow mules. According to Suntory, the company which distributes this goo, "Yogurito is made from yogurt and tastes like yogurt but is not yogurt. We cannot say that it's healthy." No shit. Nothing about this sounds healthy for either mind or body.

## Ant Gin

Here's where we go deeper into the rabbit hole. Ant gin is from Australia

and was first produced by the Aboriginal people who dwell there. It is made from the local green ants (Rhytidoponera metallica), which are smushed and mixed with lime and coriander during the distillation process. They leave some on the bottom of the bottle, in a fashion similar to the worm at the bottom of mezcal. Also, much like the mezcal worm, they are edible if you dare. It is $42 \%$ ABV, meaning it's slightly stiffer than your average vodka. "Ant gin mar-tini-shaken, not stirred."


## Tuna Tears Shōchū

Another one from Japan, shōchū (which is incidentally, along with its Korean cousin Soju which is the same thing, the most popularly sold drink in the world, by volume), is a clear, wine-like spirit weighing in at around 22-25\% alcohol. If you have never heard of it, despite it being so popular, that's okay. It's made from rice or other grain-based wine, which is then distilled like any old liquor would be. It can be made up to $55 \%$ ABV but is usually less than half that percentage. Traditionally served cold, you will find it all over most of Asia, with each country claiming to have invented it. It is also the national drink of Korea (both of the Koreas, from what I gather). What makes this so different? Well, if you go to what is known as a"tuna den" or "tuna house" in Japan, which serves fresh seafood, you can order this drink. It is just your normal shōchū, but they squeeze the eyeball fluid from the tuna
into your glass of liquor. Mmm, that tuna eye juice goes down smooth...


Smoke
A prohibition-era concoction, wherein folks desperate for a drink would go to clandestine "smoke joints" to get a glass of this cheap and very strong liquor. "What's so odd about bathtub hooch?" you might ask, and here we go: smoke was made of pure wood alcohol, which is not the kind our biology can process well. It's made by distilling wood chips and water and makes for great fuel, but you should not drink it. Deaths from the consumption of smoke were about one person per day, and that was just in the Bowery neighborhood of New York City, where they were actively tracking the stats. It's assumed that there were far, far more across the land as smoke gained popularity. The governmentin their infinite wisdom-thought that people who heard of the dangers of illegal booze would simply stay away. "Just say no." Take a guess how that one turned out. ## Horse Milk Wine

Known locally on the steppes of Mongolia as "airag" or "koumiss," it's a wine made from the milk of a horse. Supposedly tasting like champagne mixed with sour cream, it weighs in light at only 3-5\% ABV. This means you could drink that sweet horse juice all day and still be good, so bottoms up.


## Squirrel Beer

A Scottish brewing company known as BrewDog had crowdfunded a campaign to erect a new brewery in Columbus, Ohio, of all places. They met their goals, and contributors over a certain amount received a special gift: a bottle of blonde Belgian ale infused with juniper berries and Scottish nettles. Not so odd, you might think, but here's the kicker: the bottle contains beer of a whopping $55 \%$ ABV, which makes it much stronger than even most whiskeys, and it is wrapped in a taxidermied squirrel, which is typically bedecked in a silly, bespoke outfit. The only problem-should you wish to get some-is that they are reserved for those who invest more than $\$ 20,000$ in their company. That said, you also get a lifetime $20 \%$ discount on all their products, should you cough up that kind of dough. The brew is called "The End of History" and is the world's strongest beer.



## Gilpin Family Whiskey

I know what you're thinking at this point.."So what's the weird thing about this whiskey?" Well, it's a full-bodied Eng-lish-style whiskey, which has a smooth taste and is made from the urine of elderly people with diabetes. Yup, diabetic pee whiskey.
